


FY 15 Total End of Year Net Assets: : \$240,036



HOPE Recuperative Center opened October 1st to provide 24/7 care for those who are discharged "to home" from the hospital but have no home in which to recover.

Introducing HOPE Recuperative Center the first medical specialty shelter in Michigan!

HOPE Recuperative Care Center is a specialty shelter for those who are homeless but "discharged to home" from an inpatient hospital setting. Nurses provide medical oversight in this 24/7 shelter. Staff help guests link to resources such as mental health services, housing and assist guests with making medical appointments. This support is vital to transforming the individual's circumstances from homelessness to housed while the guest recovers from the medical condition that caused the hospitalization. We connect the patient with a primary care physician so that after they move from the shelter, they are able to continue to work with their doctor on achieving better health.

The goals of HOPE Recuperative Care include:

- **Resolving** the guest's medical problems
- **Providing** psychosocial assessments and as appropriate, referrals for medical, mental health, substance abuse services and housing.
- **Connect** guests with vital documents such as state ID, birth certificates and social security card
- **Discharge**, if possible, directly to housing.

In 2015, 1792 volunteers donated over 11,000 hours of their time to a variety of tasks at HOPE, including cooking and serving meals, providing healthcare, literacy classes, yoga and stress relief for guests.
